Course Description

Animal Science and Services builds directly on Agriscience Foundations 1, following Florida's state framework across a five-course sequence (Animal Science and Services 2 through 6). It progresses from foundational animal behavior and welfare into hands-on nutrition, health, breeding, grooming, exhibiting, and business record-keeping.

Animal Science and Services 2

Develops competencies in safety; animal behavior; animal welfare; animal control; and employability skills.

Animal Science and Services 3

Develops competencies in animal digestive systems; animal breeding; preventive medicine and disease control; control of parasites; animal marketing; and analyzing records.

Animal Science and Services 4

Develops competencies in animal health practices, nutrition, grooming, exhibiting, and marketing animals, and the operation, maintenance, and repair of equipment.

Animal Science and Services 5

Builds on those skills with animal marketing techniques, advanced animal health practices, and maintaining and analyzing animal records.

Animal Science and Services 6

Develops competencies in planning routine animal and facility management, and maintaining and analyzing production, financial, and insurance records.

Agritechnology and Animal Science and Services are separate pathways, and students are welcome to take both. The only prerequisite for either pathway is Agriscience Foundations 1.

Within this pathway, each course is a prerequisite for the next: 2 before 3, 3 before 4, 4 before 5, and 5 before 6. Courses are taken one per year, in order — for example, a student cannot take Animal Science and Services 4 and 5 at the same time.

Standards

This five-course sequence covers 44 state standards total from Florida's CTE Curriculum Framework for this program: Animal Science and Services 2 (8106210) covers standards 09.0–17.0, Animal Science and Services 3 (8106220) covers 18.0–28.0, Animal Science and Services 4 (8106230) covers 29.0–38.0, Animal Science and Services 5 (8106240) covers

39.0–45.0, and Animal Science and Services 6 (8106250) covers 46.0–52.0. The full standards and benchmarks can be looked up by course number at cpalms.org.

Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE)

Every student in this course develops a Supervised Agricultural Experience — a required part of Florida's agricultural education framework, built on the classroom instruction / FFA / SAE three-circle model. An SAE does not require owning land or animals. Options include:

- Placement — working or volunteering somewhere in an agriculture-related field or role
- Entrepreneurship — starting a small agriculture-related enterprise
- Research or Experimentation — a hands-on agriscience research project
- Exploratory — for students still discovering which area of agriculture interests them

These follow the national SAE for All framework — Foundational SAEs (career exploration, financial planning, workplace safety, employability, and agricultural literacy) that every student builds over their whole time in the program, plus an Immersion SAE like the options above. We will work together throughout the year to find the right fit for your student.

Industry Certifications

Students in this course have the opportunity to earn a nationally recognized industry certification — a third-party credential that carries weight with employers, counts toward Florida's school grading formula, and strengthens a college or job application.

- AEST Animal Science Specialist Certification — validates skills in animal systems and livestock management, and the use and care of animal health-care instruments, grooming equipment, and restraining equipment.
- NOCTI Small Animal Science & Technology Certification (hosted on iCEV) — validates knowledge and skills in small animal care, health, and management.

Certification testing is administered through the iCEV testing platform.

What Is FFA?

FFA (the National FFA Organization) is a premier leadership organization for students in agricultural education, built around leadership, personal growth, and career success. It isn't separate from this class — it's one of three equal parts of a complete agricultural education, alongside classroom instruction and your SAE.

FFA is student-led and student-driven — members run chapter meetings, plan activities, and hold each other's leadership positions. Adults advise; students lead.

Winter Park FFA is chapter number FL0096.

FFA Membership

All students enrolled in this course are members of Winter Park FFA. Every opportunity — Career Development Events (CDEs), Leadership Development Events (LDEs), field trips, and the chance to apply for a chapter officer position — is open to every student, regardless of experience.

FFA is woven into this course, not separate from it. Membership is deliberately low-cost — state dues are just \$10, alongside modest national dues — so cost is as small a barrier as possible. More information is available at winterparkffa.org.

Field Trips

Throughout the year, our chapter may take field trips connected to CDEs, LDEs, and other agricultural opportunities. For any field trip:

- Students are responsible for getting their missing-class documentation signed by each of their teachers. This document is provided along with the field trip paperwork and permission slip at the time of the trip.
- Students are required to make up any work missed in other classes as a result of the field trip.

Student Responsibility

As in any high school course, students are expected to advocate for themselves and take ownership of their own success. Specifically, students are responsible for:

- Turning in missing work prior to the final deadline for that grading period.
- Keeping up with their own grades and reaching out with questions before a grade becomes a surprise.
- Communicating with Dr. Paterson about any concerns, conflicts, or circumstances that may affect their work.

Extra Credit

Throughout the year, our chapter plans events for students to get involved in — service projects (at least one every month), community events, and other chapter activities. Students can earn extra credit for their involvement in these events — come participate, and it counts toward your grade.

Classroom Expectations

Our classroom culture is built around the FFA motto:

“Learning to Do, Doing to Learn, Earning to Live, Living to Serve.”

- Learning to Do — come prepared and participate fully in class
- Doing to Learn — engage in hands-on labs and follow all safety procedures
- Earning to Live — act with professionalism and integrity
- Living to Serve — treat classmates and staff with respect, and contribute to our classroom community

Instructional Approach

This class rotates between individual work, small-group work, hands-on activities, outdoor instruction, and traditional in-classroom learning — whichever format best fits the lesson and the standard being taught that day.

Class Procedures

- Be in your seat, binder open, ready to work when the bell rings.
- Follow all posted safety procedures during labs and hands-on activities — no exceptions.
- Keep your binder and scientific notebook organized and up to date; they stay in the classroom.
- Personal electronics are used only when an activity calls for them.
- Raise your hand and wait to be called on during instruction and discussion.

Materials Needed

- 1-inch, 3-ring binder
- Notebook (for a scientific notebook)
- Page protectors
- Colored pencils
- Markers
- Pencils
- Scissors

Binders and notebooks stay in the classroom for the year.

Program Fee

There is no required program fee for this course. Optional items — such as an official FFA jacket — are available separately, and no student is turned away from participating over cost. See winterparkffa.org/parents for details on jackets, fundraising, and our loaner rack.

Contact with Animals, Plants & Food

Throughout the year, hands-on instruction may bring students into contact with live animals — including poultry (chickens, ducks, turkeys), rabbits and cavy (guinea pigs), and sheep and goats — as well as plants and food products used in labs.

Please let Dr. Paterson know if your child has an allergy, and let us know whether an action plan is on file with the school nurse.

Grading Policy

Grades in this course use a points system, similar to a college course — every assignment, lab, assessment, or project is worth a set number of points, and your final grade is the total points earned out of total points possible (not a percentage weighting).

Category	Typical Points
Daily Classwork & Labs	10–25 pts each
Quizzes	20–50 pts each

Tests / Exams	100 pts each
Project-Based Learning	100–200 pts each
Professionalism & Preparedness	5–10 pts per week

Each nine-week grading period includes a minimum of one project-based learning experience — an extended, hands-on project connected to that period's standards, worth a significant share of the points possible that period.

Point values above are typical ranges and may vary by specific assignment; adjust to match your gradebook if it differs.

Attendance & Make-Up Work

Standard OCPS attendance policy applies. Under Florida Statute § 1003.24(2), any day or portion of a day a student misses to participate in an FFA or 4-H sponsored activity must be credited as an excused absence — documentation is available on request. Students have the same number of school days they were absent to complete and submit make-up work.

Assessment Retakes

Students may request to retake a major assessment consistent with OCPS retake policy. Please reach out to Dr. Paterson to discuss the process and timeline for a specific assessment.

Academic Integrity

All work in this course is expected to be a student's own, consistent with the OCPS Student Code of Conduct. Questions about a specific assignment's expectations are always welcome before it's due.
